


Staff Spotlight

Lake Chelan Health Board Invites Letters of Interest for Open Position

Lake Chelan Health (LCH) Board of Commissioners is accepting letters of interest from candidates that have a passion and interest for community involvement, leadership and a desire to grow and advance healthcare offerings in the Lake Chelan Valley. The selected candidate will fill the board seat vacated by Jeremy Jaech.

Chelan County Public Hospital District No. 2 Board of Commissioners directly oversees hospital policy and governance and will appoint the new commissioner to fulfill the remainder of the term ending on December 31, 2023. The appointed member will serve until the next election. Persons wishing to be elected to serve after the term ends would need to file for the general election in May. The candidate must be a resident and registered voter in the hospital district.

Letters of interest should include candidate's credentials and experience, as well as reasons why they want to serve as a LCH board of commissioner. Serving on the Board will require the candidate to attend meetings, review and study material and serve as an advocate for projects supporting LCH. Commissioners are offered medical, dental and vision insurance for self and eligible dependents; must pay premiums for dependents. Entitled to compensation as set and adjusted by statute. Heart Screening

Lake Chelan Health EMS and Nick of Time Foundation will host heart screenings for people ages 14 to 19 years old for Lake Chelan School District, Manson School District and Entiat School District.

Why is it important to provide heart screenings at such an early age?

Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) is the leading cause of death in exercising young athletes, happening every 2 days in the US. Most have hidden cardiac abnormalities with no warning signs until suffering an SCA.

How are the screenings performed?

Screenings consist of a Heart Health Survey asking about possible signs & symptoms or family history of a heart condition. An EKG is performed that analyzes the electrical signals of the heart and in some cases, a limited physical exam or Echocardiogram of the heart is conducted. The results are reviewed on-site by cardiologists and sports physicians experienced in EKG youth heart screens.

What does it cost and how can I Help?

To provide 400 screenings at no cost for Chelan, Manson and Entiat students ages 14-19 is about \$10,000. Most insurance companies do not pay for these types of heart health exams unless there is a reason or diagnosis to warrant an EKG or further studies. Early detection and awareness is the goal to saving young lives.

The New Lake Chelan Health Hospital is a Gift Come True

The new Lake Chelan Health (LCH) hospital facility is a gift come true for the growing Lake Chelan Valley. After World War II, as veterans returned to the Lake Chelan valley, a group of local businessmen formed the Lake Chelan Hospital Association with the intent of providing hospital facilities to the public.

The community banded together and the first hospital in Chelan opened on August 9, 1948. Again in 1968,

the community came together to form a hospital district, which opened the doors for preparing the way for a hospital construction bond that passed by a 92 percent vote in 1969. Construction of the new hospital, on Highland Avenue, began in early 1971. Tours took place in May of 1972, before officially opening for services.

Roughly 30 years later, it was beginning to show its age and with the growing population and need for space, it was recognized that a replacement hospital would be needed. Acquiring new technology and medical equipment, physical access, and keeping-up with current regulations would require intense remodeling or a replacement facility. It took almost 20 years and several bond campaigns to get the needed 60 percent supermajority to pass. In April of 2017, the hospital district received 64.6 percent approval from voters for a \$20 million bond to help build a new hospital at a new location. The new hospital would cost a total of \$44.5 million, of which \$22.5 million came from a loan to the hospital and \$2 million donated by the Lake Chelan Health and Wellness Foundation. In April of 2021 construction began at 110 South Apple Blossom Drive. The new hospital opened with a heartfelt message and video shared with the staff and community on December 5, 2022—video available at lakechelanhealth.org/news.

It has been two months since the new LCH hospital opened and not enough can be said about its ease of access, comfortable spaces and healing environment that the new building provides. The staff of LCH are grateful and thankful for the gift and opportunity to care for patients in the community's hospital.

In 2023, Lake Chelan Health will celebrate caring for the Lake Chelan Valley residents and guests for 75 Years. LCH offers a variety of hospital services and outpatient care services that include 24-hour ER care, general surgery and pain management, inpatient services, skilled recovery rehab care, physical and occupational therapy, wound and lymphedema care, obstetrics, pelvic floor health, lab and radiology services, including MRI. LCH operates three clinics: Primary Care, Specialty Care and Express Care (walk-in).

Lake Chelan Health is proud to have supported the healthcare need in the Lake Chelan Valley. February is the second year anniversary since the Express Care opened.

Express Care in downtown Chelan is a walk-in clinic offering in-person day, evening and weekend services. Data showed the Lake Chelan Valley could benefit from a walk-in clinic where community members could receive urgent care outside of traditional work and school day hours. The clinic is **open every day from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. (closed 1p.m. to 2p.m. daily).**

Providers at the clinic help patients of all ages with any immediate health concerns or conditions — such as minor fractures, DOT and sports physicals, or sore throats— that need to be addressed in the same day. Patients are seen right away rather than waiting for an appointment with their primary care provider or going to the emergency room. Patients with chronic or more expansive conditions, such as general back pain, can't be treated at the clinic and are encouraged to reach out to a specialty or primary care provider for specialized care.

COVID Vaccines, testing and boosters are offered at Express Care by appointment only.



Wound Care

Lake Chelan Health (LCH) Rehabilitation offers wound care services.

How do know if I need to see a wound care specialist?

If you have a wound that



What are common wounds caused from?

Pressure Sores, surgical wounds, radiation sores and foot ulcers due to diabetes, chronic bone infection (osteomyelitis), poor blood flow and swollen legs.

What may contribute to a wound not healing?

Some wounds may not heal well due to other conditions like diabetes, poor circulation, nerve damage or bone infection. Other contributing factors include being inactive or immobile, weak immune system, excess alcohol use, smoking and poor nutrition.

Inpatient and Outpatient Wound Care

Services are available for both inpatients and outpatients.

Inpatients are treated in their rooms while outpatients are treated in the Rehabilitation Therapy Department of the hospital.

How can I be seen for wound care services?

Inpatients are treated for wound care by a physical therapist or nurse under the direction of a physician. The inpatient physician will coordinate wound care services.

Outpatients will need to obtain a referral from their physician. Once the rehab therapy department receives the referral, they will call the patient to schedule an appointment.

The wound care team at LCH consists of a Physical Therapist who is credentialed to perform advanced wound care services, a certified lymphedema and wound therapist and a nurses trained in wound care. The wound care team provides the most up-to-date procedures with advanced wound care dressing and supplies.
